VIRTUAL VILLAGE

The Indian Beach-Sapphire Shores Association is looking into the establishment of a "virtual village;" a separate organization created by and run by residents for the benefit of residents. The purpose, broadly stated, of the village would be to allow residents to remain in their homes while being able to access services to address changing lifestyles as they age or experience adverse events.

A village operates under the principle of "neighbors helping neighbors." It is not a social service agency; it is secular; and it is not government sponsored. A village is a grassroots project, that is the creation of the residents, formed to meet the unique needs of the local community and to draw upon the resources of that community, financial and volunteer, to meet those needs.

The first village was established in the Beacon Hill section of Boston in 2001. The impetus there was the desire of aging residents to remain in their homes and their neighborhood for as long as possible. This experiment was an absolute success. There are now about 125 villages in operation in the United States and hundreds on the drawing board worldwide.

There is no set pattern for a village. The residents are free to create a village to function in whatever manner they deem appropriate. Our neighborhood has features similar to those of Beacon Hill: a neighborhood of long standing duration, long term residents, a mix of age groups, enthusiastic volunteers, and residents who want to take care of themselves. A grassroots organization like the Beacon Hill model should work well here.

What does a village do? The short answer from the previous description is whatever you want it to do and can afford. However, there are essentially three areas of focus:

- 1. access to services.
- 2. opportunities to socialize, and
- 3. promotion of wellness.

The areas do necessarily blend into each other.

First, a village can be set up to provide for "one call does all"—a kind of circumscribed concierge or referral service that is a boon to those who do not know where to start at times. Villages typically vet and line up discounted providers for services such as housekeeping, yard maintenance, pet sitting, house sitting, handyman repairs, electricians, and plumbers. However, the most requested service in existing villages is for transportation, provided at a discount or through volunteers at a nominal cost, to grocery stores, medical appointments, and even entertainment venues. Through this service, a village can promote "inter-generational contact." For example, our neighborhood can draw upon the local high school and college community for help with computer tasks and literacy, bill paying, checkbook balancing, insurance claim filing, and reading to those who are visually impaired. Both sides would benefit from such an arrangement.

Second, but most important, members of existing villages state that they derive their greatest satisfaction from the social nature of the village. Simply stated, they make friends. Services are often provided by a neighborhood volunteer. That contact is immeasurably better than an impersonal contact that would otherwise occur. A village also promotes social events such as breakfast clubs, wine and cheese parties, trips to a museum or show, book clubs, or other get-togethers. A village works to combat the isolation of aging and disability.

Finally, a village works to promote healthy life styles through exercise classes, walking clubs, tai chi, yoga, nutritional lunch meetings, as well as seminars on health issues. A village can also provide wellness checks for peace of mind of those living alone and for relatives who may live outside of the area.

All of this has a cost, of course. The typical annual cost is \$500 for an individual and \$750 for a couple. Although a village cannot be expected to and will not eliminate the need residents may have for intensive care such as a home health aid, nursing home care or hospice care, at a couple of dollars per day or less to make it more likely and comfortable to remain in one's home and neighborhood as one ages or experiences adverse events, this cost seems to be reasonable. Membership is usually limited by age to those over say 55, although any neighbor is free and welcome to volunteer.

The Association expects to make a presentation at the December annual meeting. If you have any comments or questions that you would like addressed at the presentation, please email Patrick McTernan at patrickdmcternan@me.com.

The next step following that for the Association is to engage in the "exploratory stage." This involves setting up a steering committee and mailing a questionnaire to each resident of the neighborhood so that an assessment of the needs and of the resources available, both financial and volunteer, can be made. While the questionnaire is being processed, we intend to hold a series of special meetings for information and discussion of issues raised in the questionnaire.

<u>When did your restaurant open?</u> July 14th, 2014. Bastille Day!

<u>What are your hours of service?</u> 11am – 10pm, Closed Sunday. HAPPY HOURS 4pm-6.30pm. Reservations recommended, as we are not a big restaurant. What type of items are on your food/drink menu?

- Thai French Dishes

QUEEN OF SHEBA FUSION Ethiopian Restaurant

When did your restaurant open? On July 11, 2014
What are your hours of service? Closed Monday; Tuesday –
Thursday, 11:00am – 9:00pm; Friday – Saturday, 11:00am –
10:00pm, Sun. 12noon – 9:00pm. Reservations accepted.

How is Ethiopian food prepared and served? Basically, our cuisine starts with Wot, which is meat or vegetables that are stewed in our special Ethiopian herbs and spices. Doro Wot is a stew of chicken (free range), hard boiled eggs (also free range) and combined spices and seasonings. It is a spicy dish. If spicy is not your thing, try Dora Alecha Wot, which is still stewed and flavorful, but much more mild. You will also see the expression Tibs on our menu, which is simply sautéed instead of stewed. It has its own unique seasoning, and is usually milder in the spice rating than Wot. All our meat dishes are beef, chicken or lamb.

Our vegetarian/vegan offerings will probably look familiar, since most Ethiopian vegetables have made their way into American cuisine. Lentils, yellow split peas, potatoes, carrots, cabbage, and collard greens are our specialties.

We do serve wine/beer from Ethiopia and South Africa. Refer to our online menu at ethiopianrestauranttampa.com.

What is the price range on your menu? Appetizers from \$4.00 to \$10.00 and entrees from \$10.00 to \$18.00.

<u>Do you source local products for your recipes?</u> Yes. We get our vegetables from a local farmer.

Is your menu available online? Our website is under construction, but we do have one for our Tampa location which is similar to what we will be serving in Sarasota (www.ethiopianrestauranttampa.com).

You have another restaurant in the area. Why did you decide to open another at this location? My restaurant in Tampa is called Queen of Sheba Ethiopian Restaurant. I have many customers that drive from Sarasota just to eat at my Tampa location, so I decided to open one here so I can be close to them.

How did you come up with the name of this restaurant? I love Queen of Sheba, who represents the land of Habesha, and I wanted to add more dishes to my menu so I included fusion.

<u>What challenges are involved in starting and running a</u> <u>restaurant?</u> The main challenge I face is finding loyal employees and getting used to the community would be my next challenge.

<u>Do you cater?</u> We would love to cater for birthdays, weddings, city events, and small gatherings.

BEAUTIFICATION COMMITTEE NEWSBay Haven Plans Permaculture Food Forest

There has been a lot of change at Bay Haven School of Basics Plus this past summer with the onset of a two-year phased construction project of a new two-story building. The new building will house a cafeteria/auditorium, music room, media center, computer lab, and four new classrooms. To make room for the new construction, the staff parking lot was relocated from the southwest corner of the property to the northwest corner. The playground will eventually end up at the north east end of the property once the six portable structures are removed. When the new building is completed and other buildings are demolished, there will be half an acre of open space. Staff, parents, and community members are designing an innovative use for this courtyard.

The committee's mission statement reads: Create a school garden based on Permaculture principles to educate students, teachers, and after school participants and attract them to the garden. Volunteers will maintain the space, allowing teachers to focus on lessons and garden experiences rather than maintenance. The food forest will produce fresh seasonal produce to supply the school meals.

Our vision is to transform the campus into a lush, beautiful, and abundant landscape that will serve as a source of nutrition, education, and recreation for Bay Haven and the surrounding community. We are currently working on the first phase of this transformation: installing a food forest in the strip of land next to the "historic" building. Beginning last spring we rototilled the existing grass and planted a cover crop to help build and prepare the soil for the next phase.

On September 27, 2014, staff, students, parents, and community members along with IBSSA neighbors worked together to sheet mulch, plant fruit trees and beneficial supporting plants, and install a gravel walkway. This fall the committee will work on a design for the larger courtyard. We are excited about this sustainable transformation of Bay Haven's campus.

REAL ESTATE NEWS:

There are 28 properties for sale as of this writing. This continues to be low compared to the last decade, but it's not out of line when compared to 15 years ago when inventory was even less.

These available properties continue to occupy a wide price spectrum between \$189,000 and \$13,800,000. As I've said before, this is a challenging aspect of our market for newcomers to understand. Older neighborhoods have more diversity than newer neighborhoods, many of which are planned developments with very similar houses.

Only two of these houses for sale are Bank Owned and none are listed as a Short Sale. There are eight properties "under contract"; two of which are Bank Owned, and of the 19 properties sold since May 26th, three were Bank Owned and one was a Short Sale.

This puts our total "distressed" market at about 15%. The number continues to decline as values rise and fewer homeowners are underwater on their mortgages.

Sarasota "at large" is slightly ahead of last year in total number of sales and the median sales price climbed 10% since fall of 2013. Inventory has stayed relatively stable and increases in value have slowed a bit since earlier in the year, some of which is probably due to seasonal activity.

Personally, I have found great demand for properties in IBSS, but an increase in buyer expectations. While buyers may be willing to spend the money, they seem to be less forgiving when it comes to deferred maintenance and unpermitted improvements.

Take care of your homes, especially if you are in the V or A flood zone where future owners could be hampered by FEMA restrictions on spending. They simply may not be able to save your house unless you start now.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH NEWS

Today, perhaps more than ever before, the importance of applying the principles of Neighborhood Watch (concern, awareness, and communication) to our daily lives, wherever we are, has become increasingly apparent. Watching out for one another, being aware of what's going on around us, calling the police to report criminal, suspicious, or dangerous activity in the area and then alerting our neighbors has become second nature to most of us. The significance of these actions and the urgency in which we do them has been proven to better ensure the safety of our families, neighborhoods, and nation.

Methods of communicating have advanced greatly over the years. Email alerts are now available to all residents of Indian Beach-Sapphire Shores with information regarding incidents of crime, suspicious activity, and other Neighborhood Watch updates. However, three decades ago and long before the days of personal computers, (blackberries, apples, tablets, pads, pods, and smart phones) residents would receive a telephone call or a knock on the door from their block captain, neighbor, or coordinator alerting them of a crime or other Neighborhood Watch information.

A contact person (block captain) for each street would still be very beneficial today and would allow for a bit more familiarity among residents. Ideally, the block captains introduce themselves to their neighbors, provide them with contact information, and keep an updated list of names, addresses, and telephone numbers of each resident on their street. WHY THE CHARLES HEGENER MEMORIAL NATURE WALK?

Someone recently asked me who Charlie Hegener was and why a Nature Walk was named after him. The Nature Walk in question is the pedestrian bay access in the 4000 block of Bay Shore Road. The neighborhood beautification committee takes care of it and it's an interesting place to view the bay and take in a sunset.

It leads to a major rainwater drainage pipe, which isn't the most attractive thing to look at, but Charlie probably would have been ok with that.

Charlie was a lot of things and I can only speak to a few of them. He grew up in the neighborhood, left for a career and worldly pursuits, but eventually came back and lived out his last years in the same house he spent many of his first years. He had great stories about growing up in Indian Beach and how much wilderness there was before many of the houses were built in the late 1950s and 1960s. He was a bright and ardent environmentalist and very skeptical about any proposed developments in IBSS. I specifically remember one of his later passions was rainwater runoff and how our neighborhood drains directly into Sarasota Bay.

If you have been here any length of time, you may be aware that our neighborhood rises right up out of the bay and reaches a peak at Tamiami Trail. This means any water (or anything!) that hits the ground from Tamiami Trail west runs right into our storm drains and directly into the bay.

It would take only minutes for a cigarette butt tossed out a car window travelling down the Trail to end up in the Bay ... if it was raining or when it rains again. And even though our neighborhood is bordered by Whitaker Bayou, we are not actually part of the bayou drainage basin. We are independent of the bayou and given how old most of our neighborhood is, rainwater runs directly and quickly into the bay. Most of our houses were built before rainwater retention codes existed or before landscaping swails were created to hold back rain water allowing it to percolate into the soil.

Charlie went along our entire shoreline once and counted every single drain pipe entering the bay. I was astounded by the number of pipes he told me there were but I couldn't

remember how many. So, this summer I followed in his footsteps (by kayak) and counted them myself.

There are 13 major discharge

pipes about as large as the one at the end of the Hegener Nature Walk. The easiest ones to see are at Indian Beach and Sun Circle Park. But there are 28 smaller pipes; some of which only drain a few properties.

That's a total of 41 pipes leading back to storm drains between Tamiami Trail and Bay Shore Road. They gather rainwater and all of its contents; fertilizer, litter, pet waste, automotive oil, and the newspaper you did not have time to get because it was raining so hard and it all ends up in the bay quite quickly.

If you want a better idea of what this drainage network looks like, take a look at the County provided signage on the north end of Sun Circle Park. It shows the approximate drainage area of one single discharge pipe. Unfortunately, no extensive mapping of these sewers exists or we could all "adopt" specific multiple block areas in an effort to control

what is entering our bay unmitigated by the cleaning effects of vegetation, soil, or other natural filters.

Over time our properties will slowly be redeveloped including some forms of retention that will slow down this discharge. And, some day, the North Trail will be transformed, potentially incorporating newer Southwest Florida Water Management District codes requiring the capture of "runoff". Until then, please be mindful of how you may be able to help protect Sarasota Bay.

The Indian Beach-Sapphire Shores Neighborhood Association has much more control over this than any other area in town because of our particular geography and development history.

Charlie would want you all to know this.
