PRESIDENTS MESSAGE



Dear Neighbors,

This has been another year of improvements: crime rates are down yet again, the real estate in the neighborhood

The semiannual meeting in May was well attended and we welcomed a new board member, Rolf Hanson, replacing Alan Trench who has relocated closer to downtown. Our Board is comprised of a diverse group of neighbors who don't always see eye to eye... except on one important point: we all agree that gathering information and examining it as intelligently as possible is a fundamental part of our role... certainly before taking a formal stand or other action.


Vi was well loved in the neighborhood, was an avid gardener, and generously shared plants from her garden, especially her bromeliads. Her name kept surfacing when I asked people about their gardens, so I wanted to include some of the comments and memories that reflect what a wonderful woman Vi was and how her sharing of plants continues to thrive in the neighborhood. My memory of Vi's succulent garden is that they were pointy and very hurtful plants that had taken over both her back and front yard. Vi would tell me that the sharp bromeliads would keep away the "bad guys" because they were planted underneath every window around the house......who needed a security system when you were going to get poked to death. I received many, many plants from Viola, who was an avid bromeliad collector. I continually shared many of those plants with other neighbors, so her legacy and love apparently lives on throughout IBSS. There used to be a wonderful plant exchange held during the IBSSA picnic, which was another fun way to share plants. Alene Petus, Sapphire Drive

Mrs. Viola Abel was a very special person. My family would often bike or walk down North Shore Drive to catch sight of the peacock, living in the area, strutting around looking at his reflection in car bumpers. I can still see Mr. Abel sitting on his porch enjoying the oudoors and Mrs. Abel standing by the front door smiling and waving as we passed by their house. I was reminded by a dear friend and neighbor of Mrs. Abel's that "Vi," as she was called by her friends, was fond of many types of plants, but not necessarily the flowery ones. She was very active with the Sarasota Succulent Society as well as the Garden Club. Mrs. Abel was truly one of the nicest, kindest, spunkiest, courageous, and caring persons I have known and a wonderful neighbor and friend. She was

I know my first bromeliad was a gift of Billbergia pyramidalis eighteen years ago and I have been buying an average of 25 bromeliads every year since so the dealers are way ahead of the game.

In regard to plant raffles, I could not understand the author's contention that they cause membership to drop. Poor programs will do the job very rapidly but plant raffles do give members who can't afford to buy more expensive plants an opportunity to build up their collections. I feel that each Society should decide that issue without pressure from other groups.

If the purpose of that article was to stir up controversy among the members, it sure did the trick!

There were children running and playing, and when they discovered flowering weeds in the ground, they started pulling them. Vi explained to them that the seeds of that particular weed were good for the birds and they shouldn't be pulling the weeds. Vi was stern with the children, but she was actually teaching them about plants. Vi wanted to share her knowledge of plants. I would go with her to flower shows and she taught me about flowers. One year there was going to be a freeze and Vi asked me to go with her to a Children's Haven (out past Jessica's Organic Farm) where we moved plants and vegetables into sheds for protection. Viola Abel was a wonderful neighbor who enjoyed her succulent, tropical plants. She also had plants that the butterflies would feed on. NEW NEIGHBORHOOD BUSINESS: "White Picket Produce"

IBSS residents, Sharyn Vross and her sister, Michelle Bennett, have established a new business in Sarasota: White Picket Produce, an online home delivery produce company.

Tell me about yourselves, how you arrived in Sarasota, and why you live in IBSS. Michelle and I grew up in a small town in Ohio called Boardman, and we always dreamed about working together but somehow thought it would be singing on stage together. We moved here in 1983 just after Michelle graduated from high school. She attended New College and always loved the area around the college and Indian Beach. To her that just felt like "home" so when she found the house on Indian Beach Lane, it was meant to be!

<u>What service does White Picket Produce offer</u>
<u>Sarasota residents?</u> White Picket Produce offers fresh organic produce and locally grown vegetables and fruit delivered to your Sarasota home.

Why did you decide to start this service in Sarasota? When Sharyn came back to Sarasota after living in Charlotte, she looked for a service that provided home delivery for organic produce and it didn't exist. Since we were looking to find a business together ... it just all seemed to fall into place and White Picket Produce was born.

How does it work? It's easy to start receiving your weekly, bi-weekly, or periodic deliveries based on your schedule. Just click the SIGN UP button on our website at WhitePicketProduce.com and follow the instructions. You will receive fresh, 100% certified organic fruits, vegetables, and leafy greens, as well as locally grown Sarasota farm fresh produce delivered to your door each week, along with a link to suggested recipes. We ask you to leave out a cooler on your Wednesday delivery day.

<u>What is your delivery area?</u> Currently, we deliver to select Sarasota, Lakewood Ranch, Venice, and Nokomis zip codes, but we are expanding each week.

Where does the produce come from? We search for the freshest and best priced produce in the Sarasota area and try to buy as much Florida Grown Certified Organic produce as possible. We also try to buy LOCAL and SUPPORT local farms in Sarasota and Manatee counties. But because Florida growers take a break in the summer, we are fortunate to be able to use Global Organics in Sarasota; one of the largest Organic Produce distributors in the Southeast.

<u>What size boxes do you have?</u> We have two sizes to choose from. Our Standard box will typically feed one couple or small family for the week. Generally you can

expect five to six certified organic vegetables and three to four fruits. The Large box will feed a larger family or a couple who really LOVES their VEGGIES. In the Large box you can expect six to seven vegetables and four to five fruits or greater quantity of the selection. Once or twice a month we will add some fresh herbs or garlic.

<u>Can I select produce that</u> <u>is specific to my tastes or</u> <u>likes?</u> Each Friday we

email you the menu for your weekly box. You can login to your account and make your substitutions.

<u>Do you deliver to businesses as well as residences?</u>
We can deliver to your workplace and you can even set up your own co-op online; with a group of ten or more boxes delivered to one location you can set up your own Co-Op and receive 15% off.

<u>Can your produce be purchased as gifts to neighbors,</u> <u>friends, or family within your delivery area?</u> Gift certificates are available for purchase on our website.

What other information would you like to share? We plan to add local products to expand our menu. Currently, we offer SaraFresh Juices to add to your box. We are always looking for new products that are local to Sarasota.

REAL ESTATE UPDATE: May 22, 2015

Our neighborhood Real Estate market has been healthy in 2015. The Sarasota Multiple List database reports 33 Active Listings, 6 Active With Contract Listings, 10 Pending Listings and 18 properties Sold so far this year.

Those numbers are not so different than 2014, as we typically average 3 to 4 transactions per month in IBSS. The big news is (get ready for my broken record) the RANGE in pricing for these properties. The least expensive property was \$112,000 and the most expensive was \$9,000,000! That is an 80 fold difference in sales price within our neighborhood.

We have not seen such an extreme since 2008, when we went from \$40,000 to \$12,000,000...a record likely to stand for some time.

The \$9,000,000 transaction is a double parcel directly on the bay with City views, but for \$112,000 someone got 2 bedrooms, 2 baths, terrazzo floors, and open ceilings. What to do, what to do? So many choices in what is clearly the most diverse neighborhood on the Gulf Coast of Florida.

Under the category of "Other Big News"; development is finally happening in Rus 'en Urbe or Bellora, as it is now called! Local builder, Legacy Homes, has been selected to develop this 23 lot subdivision and they have already sold a handful of properties. A model is being designed which should be coming out of the ground soon. Prices are expected to start in the \$700,000's. Remember, this roadway (Bellora Way on recently distributed literature) is a Public Right of Way, so get a look for yourself. Just be careful of contractor activity and don't forget to pick up after your pets as you would in anyone's yard.

Remember, All Real Estate is local, so if you want to know how OUR market is, put down the paper, turn off the TV, and take a walk around the neighborhood. David Jennings

The very important good news is that residents of Indian Beach-Sapphire Shores take immediate action when a crime occurs or whenever criminal activity is suspected. Applying the familiar slogan, "See It, Hear It, Report It," or the newer call to action, "See Something-Say Something," has become second nature to most of us. An excellent example of this was recently demonstrated when alert neighbors observed an unfamiliar vehicle cruising in the area, occupied by unknown persons whose actions were very suspicious. Later, it was discovered that two burglaries had been committed.

Thanks to the concern, awareness, and communication of neighbors who provided the police with pertinent information and detailed descriptions, the stolen property was recovered and the suspects were arrested. - ♦ Mail theft often leads to identity theft. We are advised to never leave outgoing mail in our mailboxes for extended periods of time and to collect incoming mail as soon as possible. A trip to the Post Office might be the safest option.
- ♦ The entryway to our lovely city, as well as the front door to our wonderful neighborhood, is often the site of unsightly behavior. Please take the time to call the police to report any crime or illicit activity you observe occurring along the historic Tamiami Trail.
