



Real Estate Update

It has been less than two months since our last update and there are not many SOLD properties to report. This is because **Sales Activity** is always a reflection of what was happening 30 to 60 days *prior to a Closing*. So, only six closings in the last 60 days is not a reflection on the last 60 days but rather a reminder of what we were doing (or not doing) 90 to 120 days ago. That time frame puts us smack dab in the middle of August and September. Can you remember that far back? I know it's hazy, but remember the heat, humidity, and hurricanes? Me neither.

Something to keep in mind about the time frames referenced above—it takes the Board of Realtors an *additional* 30 days to compile and report the sales results of any particular month and another week for the Sarasota Herald to run a headline telling you all you need to know about the local market—only now the real scoop is over 90 days old. All this information is garnered by looking in the rear-view mirror and is an indication of Buyer behavior months ago, not today.

I also need to remind our readers the Real Estate information in this newsletter comes from the Multiple Listing Data Base used by the Realtor Association of Sarasota and Manatee Counties. This may not be a complete presentation of all sales or available properties. A few sales each quarter may be handled by estate attorneys or homeowners comfortable with selling their property without Brokers and the public marketing venues Brokers utilize. I have recently been called to task for omitting "For Sale By Owner" properties, but we do not have an accurate or consistent way to present these opportunities, short of driving up and down every street to see who may have a sign in their yard (today) or entering every neighborhood address in Zillow to see who may have clicked the For Sale (maybe) button. In addition, these newsletter reports only intermittently include lots for sale or North Trail commercial activity.

One of my New Year's resolutions (yes, it's that time again) will be to try and occasionally report on this additional activity so we are all looking at the most complete and accurate picture of our local Real Estate Market. -David Jennings

BETTY BOYLAN

I always enjoy my morning walk with my dog Rudy through Sun Circle Park. It is even more enjoyable when I see Betty Boylan during her walk. In 1972 Betty and her husband, Art, came to Sarasota from South Lyon, Michigan to visit their friend, Nellie Stowe, at the Orange Acres Trailer Park. Art and Betty visited with another friend, Ila, also from South Lyon, who owned a home on Myrtle Street and Old

Bradenton Road. The following year, when Betty and Art visited Sarasota again, they noticed the house next to IIa on Myrtle was for sale, and they immediately decided to buy it as their winter home. Betty called it her "happy house." She drove from Michigan to Sarasota with her Doberman, Sallie, for the winter months. Art was a metallurgist for a steel company and travelled often so he could fly into Florida as easily as Michigan. They soon grew tired of traveling back and forth, so when Art retired in 1978, they moved to Sarasota permanently.

Betty enjoyed riding her bike over to the Sapphire Shores neighborhood. One evening in 1980 she was riding her bike down Woodland Drive and John Wallrath, a realtor and resident on Woodland, was walking back to a house after taking down a "for sale" sign. Betty stopped and mentioned

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she was interested in living in the area. He gave her the key to the house, told her it wasn't occupied, and invited her to come back and spend time at the house over the weekend. Art and Betty did just that. They loved the quietness and beauty of Woodland Drive and Sapphire Shores and decided it was a perfect place for them. They bought the house at 437 Woodland Drive and relocated from Myrtle Street. Art was a private person who

enjoyed spending time at home, while Betty enjoyed going to the park, meeting new friends, and being out and about. Unfortunately, in 1984, Art was diagnosed with cancer and endured a long illness until his death in 1987.

Betty still does her morning crossword puzzle, enjoys sewing, baking pies and cookies, and driving her cart to the park each evening to meet with neighbors and play with their dogs. Betty has seen many changes in the neighborhood, including the development of Sun Circle Park. Since I have only lived in Florida five years, Betty tells me stories about our neighborhood. A few weeks ago she mentioned the plaques

BOB NALVEN

(Dec. 1918 - July 2012) South Shore Drive

Bob moved to Sarasota in 1954 with his wife and three daughters. His father purchased land in Sarasota and asked Bob to head up the new venture: Desoto Lakes. Two years later he joined the engineering firm of Smally. Welford & Nalven. His

civic work included serving as President of the West Coast Symphony Orchestra (now the Sarasota Symphony), President of the Visiting Nurses Association, and President of the Florida Shore and Beach Preservation Association. He also served on Sarasota's first environmental advisory committee and the Recreational Council, helping to bring a public beach to Siesta Key. He served as PTA President at Bay Haven and Sarasota High Schools, where his daughters attended school. -Excerpt from "Herald Tribune Obituary"

I would see him often at Sun Circle Park with his two poodles, Barney and Lucy. Bob's third wife was Karen Zittel. -Betty Boylan

Bob Nalven's memorial popped up a couple years before he passed. Maybe he had it put there when he moved into a care facility. He lived on South Shore Drive in a house he co-designed with Tollyn Twitchell, Ralph Twitchell's son. The property has been marketing as a Twitchell but Bob would certainly claim to have had a hand in the plan. He was president of IBBSA at one time.

PETER TRIGG

(June 1945 - June 2007) Bay Shore Road

A lifelong newspaperman, Peter

Trigg combined his experience as a news editor with his computer skills to help modernize newsrooms of several newspapers in the 1980s, including the Sarasota Herald-Tribune. Trigg, who came to the paper in 1974 as an assistant news editor, went on to become one of the founding editors of The New York Times Regional Media Group's wire service. He also helped develop a

computer network for The Times and more than 30 of its affiliates to share their graphics. After retiring as manager of the Times news services production system in 2001, he returned to the HT in 2004 as a part-time state editor. Peter was tremendously well respected in the newsroom. He had a natural curiosity for all things technical, and a wonderful determination to find new and better ways to produce the news product." Peter died of lung cancer at the age of 61. -Excerpt from Herald-Tribune Obituary

Peter Trigg was described as a "newspaperman's newspaper man" by the Sarasota Herald, as I recall. In his retirement he was the editor of our newsletter and was an IBSSA board member. He and his family loved their Bay Shore property, purchased in 1979, so much I remember his son's wedding reception in the front yard under a big white tent.

(? - 1996) Alameda Drive

John served as the artistic director of the Asolo Repertory Theatre from 1983 to 1991. John also taught improv to actors and neighbors. He had

many friends in the neighborhood. He lived on Alameda Drive and would bring his dog, Dillon, over to walk through Sun Circle Park. I had the Mahogany tree planted for John, which is still there. Marty Petlock lived on North Shore Drive and told me he used to come down to John's plaque every morning and say "Good morning, John." —Betty Boylan

Thank you to John Ulmer, former Asolo Repertory Artistic Director and acting coach to many grateful actors. He always had a twinkle in his eye and with love helped us discover the truth in our work. I still imagine he is in the audience whenever I am onstage. —Jenny Aldrich

John was my college professor at Carnegie Tech. He went on to head the Drama Department after it became Carnegie-Mellon. He came to Sarasota to direct a show at the Asolo in the 70s and later took over as Asolo Artistic Director, guiding the company from the old theatre into the new facility. A veteran of New York and Broadway, John was a major force in Sarasota's Theatre scene in the late 80s and early 90s. -Marty Petlock

SANDRA LYNN CLEMENS PRICE

(March 1948 - April 1995)

BART COTTEN

(Aug. 1931 - April 2001) Woodland Drive

Charles Barton Cotten passed peacefully at his residence following a two-year battle with leukemia. Bart was born in Tampa and moved to Sarasota in 1981. He immediately embraced the



IBSS neighborhood. He served as president of the association for six years. Upon his retirement, in appreciation for his dedication,



the association board members commissioned the whimsical fish sculpture at the park. His accomplishments include the institution of the annual picnic, a spring event, improvements to the Indian Beach park area, lowering the speed limits from 40mph to 25mph, and clean-up efforts along the bay. -Excerpt from "IBSSA Shorelines", Summer 2001

Bart was a wonderful human being. He and his wife, Mariana, bought the house next to me on Woodland in 1990 and remodeled it. He grew hydroponic lettuce at a farm in Bradenton that was sold at Publix. Bart was very involved in neighborhood issues and wanted everything to be peaceful. He was a very calm, gentle man. -Betty Boylan
