It is called: **COS Click-2-fix.** It allows you to take a picture on your cellphone of a problem such as a pothole, broken tree limb, cracked/uneven sidewalk or vegetation that blocks the sidewalk, etc. It can be used anywhere in the city, not just in our neighborhood. You then send that picture and report it directly to the department in the city. I do suggest that you add your email address when you report the problem. This will allow the city to reply and let you know that they have taken care of the issue. Contact me if you have questions regarding this app.

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## **Meeting with Sarah and Johannes**

How did a Mexican woman and a German man converge in Sarasota? Via Michigan. And Mexico and Miami!

For Sarah Hernandez, her Mexican upbringing was rooted in Quakerism. Both her parents converted to the "Friends" faith. And she went to Quaker school, including Earlham College whose mascot is a Quaker.

For Johannes Werner, he graduated from a university in West Berlin. His interest in journalism developed and he earned a Master's degree in Modern History. The couple met while visiting Mexico City where Johannes was researching Mexico's role in the 19<sup>th</sup> century global silver trade. Later, they visited Berlin "after the Wall fall".

In 1992 they moved to Mexico City where Johannes became Crain Communications' Mexico Correspondent. Sarah, meantime, was working on her doctoral dissertation on worker-owned business. It was at the University of Michigan that Sarah earned her Ph.D in Sociology. Johannes, meanwhile, worked for a weekly newspaper in Detroit. So, naturally, all these roads led to Sarasota.

Sarah landed a teaching position at New College. Having been with this innovative institution for 25 years, she is an Associate Professor of Sociology and Co-Director of the Initiative on Diversity and Equity in Academics.

In Florida, Johannes helped start The Gulf Coast Business Review and spent two years as a business editor for the Daily Business Review in Miami. While at the Business Review, he started the Cuba Standard which is about the Cuban economy. "While U.S - Cuba relations had ups and downs", he said, "I remain

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optimistic because the Cubans are highly educated and eager to succeed."

As a couple, they became even more dedicated to promoting the peaceful activism of Quaker practices. They joined a Friends meeting at New College. Almost 20 years ago, a meeting house was built near Lockwood Ridge which accommodates a membership approximating 60 people.

Their residence in Indian Beach features Cuban, Mexican and German art. Their daughter, Mar, is now a sophomore at the University of Florida where she majors in Biochemistry and Computer Science.

During two of Sarah's sabbaticals they took Mar to Mexico and then to Germany. She went to local schools in both countries and speaks both languages.

Continuing to be engaged in "the search for social justice and peace", Sarah mentors low-income, first generation students through the UnidosNow Future Leaders Academy. She also participates in the antiracism working group among other organizations.

Recently, Johannes began working with the Democratic Party and helped establish the Suncoast Clean Jobs Alliance. Their goal is to show that a green transition can create good jobs.

Author's note: I am also a Quaker and attend Sunday meetings for worship. All are welcome.



## Meet Your Neighbor: Megan Howell...UPDATE!

When invited to introduce myself a little over a year ago, I wrote about my day job, which is also my night job.

Well, I'm still at work -- because I love what I do.

I'm the executive director of Second Heart Homes, a startup nonprofit organization dedicated to housing, helping and loving chronically homeless adults with mental illnesses. Our board, small staff and I aim to provide not only a home, but hope and the opportunity for our clients to live with dignity and purpose.



We strive to house homeless people as quickly as possible, but we don't stop by providing a roof over their heads. We join them in a mission to improve their lives through safe and clean housing in a partnership with us, to be the best they can be -- sober, stable and out of trouble.



Achieving those mutual goals requires us to deeply engage our clients and to offer them high-touch services, no matter the time of day and, yes, love.

So, if you see me coming and going at odd hours of the night, I'm most likely responding to an emergency at one of our homes; perhaps someone forgot to take his medication, or maybe a sink got clogged.




The work is rewarding. Actually, it's a personal calling. At Second Heart Homes, we believe it's our duty to serve others -- especially those who are typically underserved -- and in the process, improve conditions in neighborhoods and business districts. Homelessness is bad for people and the community.

The challenges are many but there are positive developments to share. Last year, Second Heart Homes owned one home for men. Now, we own *four* properties that house 24 men. What's more, we recently purchased two duplexes that will soon enable us to house and help 12 single women (our first endeavor with homeless females).



We cannot serve everyone in need, but we are proud to say that in the near future, because of Second Heart Homes and its supporters, there will be 36 fewer mentally ill, homeless individuals panhandling, generating calls to police and clogging the courts.

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## The Native Slash Pine







One drawback of the current real estate boom is the complete removal of trees from some lots subject to redevelopment. When a demolition company rather than a tree-service company shows up, things are about to get extreme. Yes, Sarasota has a tree ordinance, but it does not stop removal if mitigation conditions are met; trees are identified as a nuisance species or deemed "sick" by an arborist for hire. It is particularly painful to see native Slash Pines go down. They can live up to 200 years and populated the entire neighborhood before our arrival. Granted, it's hard to live directly under one because of the sap they drop but padding around the big ones almost feels like being next to a West Coast sequoia. Well-positioned Slash Pines are awesome to behold and will stand, dead and silvery, for as long at they might live. You can see some of these skeletons on the New College Campus. Ospreys use the dead branches to construct their aeries and if you have the eyesight, you'll see other large birds of prey perched in them 100 feet off the ground. Bald Eagles, Great Horned Owls, and hawks of various kinds. We should try harder to appreciate what came before us including the Slash Pine.

## **LOOKING TO SELL OR PURCHASE A HOME?**



## Make your own compost!

- Many types of compost bins will do the job, including sealed plastic bins with removable tops or sealed drums that are mounted so they can easily be turned. You can make your own bin by bending wire mesh a few feet tall into a circle and attaching the ends using zip ties. Even a pile of scraps layered with plant material on the ground works.
- Add any vegetable or fruit scraps, but not meats.
   Eggshells, coffee grounds and coffee filters are okay.
- Add any plant material, like lawn clippings. Alternate layers of fruit and vegetable scraps with plant material. The scraps will speed up the compost process for the plant material and the layered plant material will discourage rodents and other animals from finding the tasty scraps.
- Compost piles or bins are best in sunny areas. Sealing up or turning the compost is unnecessary because of our heat, but these techniques will accelerate the process. A well-sealed bin protects against animal intrusion.
- After your compost has been piled for three to four months, use a pitchfork on the pile and remove the nutrient-rich compost at the bottom of the bin. Newer additions to the bin may not have composted yet and can be left behind for the next round.
- Once you have your compost, place it around the drip line of your fruit trees or work it into your raised vegetable garden before you plant.
- Apply composting principles to your lawn, too. The more plant debris that you leave on your property to compost and put back into your yard and garden, the better.
- Lawn clippings compost well but need to be composted after they lose their bright green color, as they will rob plants of nitrogen as they decompose.

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## The Intrepid Gopher Tortoise...

We are fortunate to live where wildlife and people can get along rather well. The intrepid and unusual Gopher Tortoise (Gopherus polyphemus) lives from 40-60 years in this environment, can grow to be bigger than a turkey platter and dig tunnels more than 30 feet long.

They like the sandier, dry soils in a scrub or hammock area. This endangered tortoise species is capable of moving long distances (0.6 mi). although they are generally quite sedentary, and little is known about their dispersal. Home range



varies with habitat, season, and sex of the tortoise, but males move more frequently and have larger home ranges than females. Different studies have reported annual average home ranges of 1-100 acres for males and 0.2-14 acres for females. That is a lot of walking for these slow and trudging creatures.

Tortoises do not reach sexual maturity until about 10–15 years of age and tend to mature faster in areas where food resources are abundant. Females lay their eggs in the sand mound at the burrow entrance or in another open, sunny spot. Predation of eggs and hatchlings is high. Females may only have one successful clutch every 10 years.

#### Fun Facts:

Gopher tortoises feed on a variety of plants and also spread and fertilize seeds through their dung. Gopher tortoises cannot swim! Never relocate a tortoise to water. The longest recorded gopher tortoise burrow was over 47 feet long! Remember if you see a gopher tortoise hole, do not interfere with the animals, or feed them, as this can disturb their healthy habitat.
