

### President's Message



Hello IBSS neighbors,

I would like to take this time to wish you all a wonderful Spring. IBSS is experiencing a lot of new construction, and not only on our neighborhood sidestreets. Soon 3 of the 4 empty lots on US 41 will have luxury apartment buildings. They will be similar to the Solle Luxury Apartments next to Starbucks. I, along with Board members, have been meeting with concerned residents, developers and city representatives to discuss issues and try to make sure that what is being built will complement and become a great fit for the neighborhood.

Beautification Chair Kate Bloomquist and Board member Alison Albee, with the City of Sarasota's approval, have applied for a grant from the Sarasota Bay Estuary Program to beautify and extend our Greenway from 45<sup>th</sup> Street all the way to 47<sup>th</sup> Street. This would mean removing the asphalt that was put there years ago and making it a continuous greenspace for future neighborhood events. We are hopeful that this happens... it has long been on our beautification radar of projects "to do"! Neighbors may be noticing activity by FPL and Davey Tree. FPL is currently replacing utility poles in IBSS, hardening their infrastructure to prevent service interruptions during future hurricanes.



# **Did You Know?**

Collectively, the urban forests in the 29 metropolitan and micropolitan areas in Florida intercept an estimated 50 billion gallons of water a year, resulting in savings of over \$451 million in avoided annual stormwater treatment costs. To put this volume of water in context, that is enough to fill approximately 75,000 Olympic sized swimming pools each year."

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### The Cabbage Palm





### The Benefits of Urban Trees and Storm Water Run-off...



Stormwater runoff is the rainwater that flows over the ground after a rain event. Impervious surfaces, such as roads, parking lots, and rooftops, do not allow water to infiltrate into the soil. Instead, these impervious surfaces swiftly direct large volumes of water into nearby stormwater drains that typically discharge into neighboring waterbodies. In urban areas with increased impervious surfaces, stormwater runoff can be a significant source of pollution to local waterbodies.

As water flows over impervious surfaces, it can pick up many different pollutants (e.g., antifreeze, grease, pesticides, bacteria, etc.) that are present on these paved surfaces. Trees help combat the negative effects of stormwater runoff by capturing rainfall on their leaves and bark, thereby reducing the amount of water hitting impervious surfaces. In addition, tree roots and old fallen leaves can promote soil conditions that allow more water to enter the soil during a rain event.

The tree's existence benefits us all, from bark to leaf, trunk to root. The process of growth increases the benefits throughout its impact area. The incredible values of trees in Florida, the filtration system that the tree roots can provide, tree biology and absorption from trunk, limbs and leaf mass, can reduce the impact of flooding rains, contaminants and construction on our ecosystem. ### **Indian Beach**

Indian Beach, a place for watching the sunset, meeting up with friends, admiring shore birds, sometimes glimpsing a dolphin, and always, hearing the soothing or boisterous sounds of the water...



What a treat to have this place right in our neighborhood. It has also been a place where several of us have felt drawn to looking after. For some years now we have met there once a week (or more often) to remove fallen fronds, trim dead branches, tidy the walkway, pull plants considered invasive weeds, and even remove plants growing in the sidewalk cracks. These last two activities we started doing to discourage the use of Roundup or other pesticides by the Parks Department of the city. Over the years we've also added benches (now others have done so, too), a recycling bin, containers for cigarette butts. Now there is a recycling bin from the city, we're happy to say. The Parks

Department of the city has been great to work with, but they don't have the time and personnel to look after it as often as we do. They seem to be happy with our work, as we also try to stay within their parameters.

Many other neighbors and friends also look after the area. John Hoover, for example, removes chunks of asphalt from the Bay and has added signage in which he informs Bay visitors of the damage of asphalt to marine life. According to John, the asphalt was deposited in the Bay years ago from road construction. He and other neighbors are collectors of "people debris", which is a constant nuisance, (and mind boggling to those of us who can't imagine tossing empty bottles, etc, just anywhere instead of into a nearby receptacle).

When Jack Wooster was head of Greenspace he purchased many native beach plants for the area. He also added mulch and watered the plants. They are still thriving and we gradually continue to add more. Kate Bloomquist has now taken over that position from Jack and we are very grateful to include her.



There is also one of those wonderful "little libraries" on the south side of the beach. David Morriss built it several years ago, secured it in place, and it has been actively used ever since.

Since there are only two of us, Kim Mitchell and I, doing the general plant tidying (and during the summer, just one), we welcome anyone who might also find it fun keeping our Indian Beach a place to enjoy and cherish. ### **Destination Sarasota**

Today the trend continues, as it seems like no matter what publication you pick up or log on to, Sarasota continues to be a topic of conversation for those looking to make a move to Florida.

U.S News and World Report alone on their website has Sarasota, FL with the following accolades:

- #1 Best Places to retire in the country
- #2 Best Places to live in FL
- #2 Fastest Growing cities in the country
- #5 Safest Places to live in the U.S.
- #9 Best Places to live in the country
- #15 Best Places to live for quality of life

Also, Trip Adviser once again has Siesta Key Beach as #2 Best Beach in the country and #14 in the world.

Some common questions most real estate brokers are being tasked with answering are, "How long is this going to go on for?" and "Will the prices continue to rise or fall?" and "Will more inventory become available?"

While many brokers will be hesitant to predict the future, most will agree to explain that the extreme demand for housing in our area continues to keep the listing inventory at an historic low. A great example of this trend can be seen in the statistics for January recently released by The Realtors Association of Sarasota and Manatee, which compares the median days on the market. It shows that the median time to contract in January 2021 was 19 days. In January 2022 we saw that time decrease to 7 days or (-63.2%) respectively. We also saw inventory levels drop by 50% from 1.2 months of inventory in January 2021 to 0.6 months of available inventory for January 2022. With this recipe of continued high buyer demand and historic low inventory, one can suspect that prices should continue to trend upward for the near future.

In summary, our IBSSA neighborhood, in the last two months, saw 12 homes go Pending ranging from \$400,000 to \$7.5M, 7 properties Sold in the range of \$220,000 to \$1M and we currently have 6 homes Active from \$375,000 to \$22M. Our neighborhood continues to be a highly desirable area, mostly attractive to buyers because of its location to downtown Sarasota and SRQ airport, its historic charm and access to water and parks. But above all for its friendly neighbors. Thank you for all you do to contribute to our neighborhood.
