NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH NEWS

We are so fortunate to live in an area where neighbors care about the safety and well-being of one another. This was evident by the number of people in attendance at the recent Neighborhood Watch meeting, and although we live in a great neighborhood, crime is still a major concern to us all. Unfortunately, the last few months have seen numerous reports of criminal activity in our area. The nighttime burglary of an occupied house took place while the resident was asleep, and a daytime residential burglary occurred while the owner was outside in his yard. In both cases, jewelry and money were stolen. Several attempted break-ins were also reported......one neighbor's lawn mower was taken from his yard while his yard was being done, and another had a cellular phone stolen from his locked car while it was parked in his driveway in the middle of the day.

There have also been reports of suspicious persons in our neighborhood. Information provided by a neighbor on patrol helped the police to identify and locate one such person. Most recently, some jewelry and money were taken during a daytime residential burglary where the thieves broke a lock on a sliding glass door. Alert individuals, working nearby, were able to notify the police right away and give complete descriptions of the suspects. Thanks to the efforts of these concerned and caring people, our entire community was made aware that these criminals, a white, middle-aged man and woman driving a new light blue car, were burglarizing houses in our area.

Crime in our neighborhood is very disturbing and should inspire us to be extra cautious and even more suspicious of anything which appears to be out of the ordinary.

GUEST EDITORIAL

As Ringling's new president, I want you to know how pleased I am to be joining your neighborhood. Dr. Arland Christ-Janer has accomplished so much with the design, construction and landscaping of a first-class campus. I want to assure you that the Ringling School will continue to be a good neighbor.

We have some exciting plans that involve new construction on our campus. In August of 1997, we will open our new Campus Housing Village. The village, at the intersection of Old Bradenton Road and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Way, will consist of apartment-style living for more than 200 students. The Housing Village will consist of 51 fully furnished units; each with four private bedrooms, two baths and living, dining and kitchen areas. Each bedroom will have fiber-optic cabling for Internet and campus network access. The Lawson Group, Architects have designed this beautiful complex. Ground-breaking took place on August 14 and construction is under way with completion scheduled for July 1997.

The Ringling School has also purchased some additional North Trail "frontage" property to be used for future expansion. Our space and planning staff is busy developing plans for these new acquisitions. The purchases include the Tropical Point Motel, the AMOCO service station and two lots behind the station. The property will be completely redesigned for instructional and administrative purposes.

The new construction is not a signal that the Ringling School will be expanding its enrollment anytime soon. Ringling's 800 students come here from 44 states and 35 countries. We are building, not to enlarge, but to improve the learning environment in which we study and live. While the School has a national and emerging international reputation, we maintain our motto as, "Sarasota First!" We want to repay the generous support that the people of Sarasota and the members of this Neighborhood Association have provided. The Ringling community takes its civic responsibilty seriously. It is an important lesson for our students and one that we will continue to exercise as an institution.



DR. CHRIST-JANER RETIRES

After a 12 year tenure at The Ringling School of Art & Design, Dr. Arland Christ-Janer has retired as president to become president emertis. Nearly 300 associates and friends gathered at Michael's On East to pay tribute to a man who took the reigns of an ailing and non-accredited school and molded it into one of the finest art schools in the nation. His contributions to the school, this community and to this neighborhood in particular will be a legend for decades to come. I was asked as the president of our association to write a few comments that would be included with others to compile a book of tributes to Dr. Christ-Janer. The following were my thoughts.

" It was only a matter of days after moving into our home on Indian Beach Drive in 1981, that we were paid a visit by one of our new neighbors, the late Miss Dorotha Dawson. Dorotha's mission was to inform all who moved into the neighborhood what was or was not "politically correct" at the time, and high on her list of correct behavior was support for the Ringling School of Art & Design. While all I could see at the time was a struggling art school with a tiny enrollment, housed in a few old buildings in poor repair, her extraordinary vision allowed her to see something of real value to this community and especially this neighborhood. A few years later things started to happen..... new the old buildings were buildings appeared, expanded, refurbished. campus was the laundromat, a convenience store, a beauty shop and car wash were cleverly transformed into attractive and useful structures. As the school's enrollment grew, it's reputation also grew to become known as one of the leading art schools in the nation. All these things seemed to happen rather quietly and it was not until I had become more active in civic affairs through this association, that the reason for all these dramatic changes became very obvious. One very special, talented, hard working, dedicated man is responsible for what the Ringling School of Art & Design has become - Dr. Arland Christ-Janer.

This neighborhood and its association owes you, Dr Christ- Janer, a great debt for the harvest we have received through your accomplishments. By the way, I know Dorotha has been watching the whole transition and thanks you for making her vision come true.":

Check your voter registration card for your precinct number. If you live within precinct 49, your polling location is The Jeanne McElmurray Auditorium which is on the north side of General Spaatz Blvd. across from the USF Sudakoff Center. If you live within precinct 16, your polling location is The Bay Haven School of Basic Plus, 2901 W. Tamiami Circle. If you live in The Uplands it could be that you live within precinct 49 OR precinct 28. If you live in precinct 28, your polling location is The Tri-Par Estates Recreation Hall, 5101 Bel-Air Ave.. If you are not sure of your precinct, call the Elections Office at 951-5300, give them your address, and they will direct you to the correct polling place. If you need transportation to the polls and are registered as a Democrat, call 924-4977. If you are registered as a Republican, call 379-0233. If you are registered as neither, and all else fails, call Bart at 351-3236.
