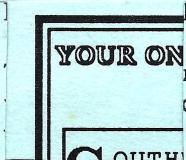

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

I have reviewed statistical surveys dating back through 1989 and have noticed a marked reduction in crimes committed in a general basis. However burglaries of residences continues to remain relatively stable at about 120 incidences per year. This alone should help to remind each of us to continue being an extension of the "eyes and ears" of our Police Department.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH is the act of merely looking out for each other in the daily course of our lives. One of the most helpful and simple things one can do is to get the names and phone numbers of the neighbor on each side of his home. The more information we have for getting in touch with one another during a possible emergency, the more secure your invisible web of communication becomes.

Also, remember that according to the Police the highest crime times run from Thursday - Saturday between the hours of 10 pm - 3 am. Therefore it makes sense that the largest deterrent to Residential Burglary would be good lighting around your home.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

Within our Neighborhood we have four areas; each one has a volunteer Coordinator, who depends on Block Captains within this area to more efficiently be in touch with the individual households and so on.

Basically these four areas run from the Ringling Museum south to Whitaker Bayou and are all west of 41 (North Tamiami Trail). Within these four areas there are twelve zones and within each zone there's a need for at least several Block Captains.

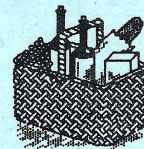

BEAUTIFICATION

INDIAN BEACH PROJECT

The Association has targeted the rejuvenation of Indian Beach (corner of Indian Beach Drive and Bay Shore Road) as its next major beautification project. Phase One of this project will be to return the natural sandy bottom to the beach and the area of bay bottom exposed at extreme low tide. This area has been strewn with concrete rubble and sections of road tar mat in recent years, which detracts from the area's physical appearance and functionality as a bathing and sunning area for Neighborhood residents.

Although, as noted in previous newsletters, Indian Beach is private property, owned jointly by all property owners in the Bay Haven subdivision, the City of Sarasota has agreed to haul away all debris that is stacked in an orderly manner on the City's right of way near the beach. No permitting is required to remove debris from the beach or bay provided all such removal is done manually.

Please mark your calendars. The association is seeking volunteers to participate in a coordinated clean-up effort to begin Saturday March 21, 1992 at 8:30 am. Thereafter we will conduct clean-ups at 8:30 am on the third Saturday of each month, until the job is finished.

Phase Two of the Indian Beach Project will involve improvements to the area in keeping with the artist's renderings which have been presented at past General Meetings of the Association. Funding for the improvements will be primarily the responsibility of residents of the Neighborhood. A donation drive is currently being coordinated and you may be contacted soon to request your participation.

BEAUTIFICATION AWARDS PRESENTED

The Association recently presented Beautification Awards to the Ringling School of Art and Design and The French Hearth (Cafe of the Arts) in recognition of the improvements made to their respective facilities along the North Trail.

All properties within our Neighborhood, both residential and commercial are eligible for Beautification Award consideration. The criteria are simply a substantial esthetic upgrading to a property and/or the exterior of it's improvements. Judging will be conducted by the Associations Beautification Committee.
