How's and Why's of Recycling

(Thank you to Natalie F. for this idea and for collecting this information!)

Whenever we recycle, we save natural resources that would have been used to make a new item. As a result, energy costs are saved, and the item does not end up in the landfill, saving money and maintaining our environment. (https://www.sarasotafl.gov/government/planning/sustainability/recycling)

Here is a list of items that can be recycled, and how to prepare those items before placing them in your green bin (with the yellow lid)! Also listed are items that cannot be recycled, in red.

ALUMINUM and STEEL CANS

Empty and rinse.

CARTONS

- Food and Beverage Cartons
- Empty, rinse and replace cap.

GLASS

- Bottles and Jars
- Empty, rinse and replace cap.

PLASTICS

Empty, rinse and replace cap.

PAPER

- Mixed Paper, Paper Board, Newspaper and Magazines
- Flatten cardboard and boxes.
- Remove liner and food from pizza boxes.
- Place food contaminated paper/ cardboard products in the garbage.
- Place shredded paper in paper bags only (no plastic).

Kitchen, Laundry, Bath Bottles and Containers

Empty, rinse and replace cap.

Contamination

- One of the biggest challenges communities face is the risk of contamination. Any item placed in a recycling container that is
 not accepted in the local recycling program is considered a contaminant. Some of the most common contamination items
 include food and liquids, non-recyclable plastic, small appliances and yard waste. Plastic bags and tanglers (i.e. hoses, holiday
 lights, hangers and extension cords) tend to wrap around the recycling processing equipment and can cause massive delays
 for a recycling processor.
- To prevent contamination, only place items accepted in the recycling program into the recycling container. Non-recyclable materials and materials that are not accepted in Sarasota's recycling program must be sorted out at the recycling facility and transported to the landfill for disposal, which increases labor and disposal costs. Remember, when in doubt, throw it out!

- Non-Recyclable Plastic (#6), Polystyrene Foam
- Recyclables in Plastic Bags, Yard Waste
- Foods, Liquids, Paper Napkins, Plates, Cups and Tissues
- Hoses, Holiday Lights, Hangers and Extension Cords
- Concrete, Wood and Construction Debris
- Plastic Bags, Film/ Sheeting and Flexible Film Packaging
- Textiles, Bedding, Rugs and Carpet, Electronics
- Small Appliances, Auto Parts/Scrap Metal
- Broken glass, Ceramic tiles, Dishes, Glassware
- Eyeglasses, Flowerpots (ceramic, clay or plastic), Hangers
- Hard-cover books, Lightbulbs, Mirrors
- Packing materials, Plastic deli trays, Plastic toys
- Pool and other chemical containers, Pots, Pans, Ovenware
- Styrofoam® and Styrofoam® peanuts, Window glass

They pick up: computers, servers, hard drives, circuit boards, battery backups, flat screen monitors, printers, DVD players, VCRs, modems, batteries, routers, x-ray film, cell phones/mobile phones, telephones, phone system hardware, insulated cable and wire, video games, X-boxes, iPads, tablets, cable boxes.

They <u>do not</u> pick up cathode ray tube TVs or computer monitors.

Older CRT TVs, furniture, etc. can be left out for City solid-waste pickup, but only one item per week.



Reporting an issue in the City of Sarasota just became easier.


The City has created an app you can download to report problems such as potholes, broken sidewalks, tree limbs down, parking meters, and many more. City departments receiving the submissions include: Public Works, Parks & Rec, Utilities, Risk Management, Parking, and Code Compliance. Users

can also add photos and the physical location of the issue to assist staff.

The app forwards your submission to the appropriate

departments where, during normal working hours, they will take care of the requests. Users will receive email updates and/or can return to the site to check the status of submitted issues. When the issue is resolved, it will be closed.

Brand new in The Trail Plaza, **Bacres** is an "European Artisan Deli". The restaurant's name comes from **bak**(e) and **res**(taurant). The baking section encompasses an array of variegated breads, cheesecakes, pecan pie and Black Forest cake. The restaurant part includes goulash, soups, salads, pierogies, and burgers served on "homemade buns". Specials include stewed beef with vegetables and pork meatballs with pappardelle. Migrating from family restaurants in New Jersey, forthright Manager Paul Nowak moved to Sarasota six months ago. He underscored that at **Bacres** "everything is made from scratch right here and the ingredients are the freshest. We are doing a lot of take-out and hope to have a liquor license soon."

Speaking of spirits, the **Bahi Hut Lounge** has happy hour every day. The Lounge food includes Crab Rangoon, veggie spring rolls, Polynesian fries, chicken tenders and mini tacos. Young Operations Manager Debbie Rodriguez stated, "Our facilities have been greatly enlarged so we can host private parties and wedding receptions from 75 people up to 300. Live music on Friday and Saturday nights features reggae and oldies."

And yes, the **Bahi Hut** still has Drag Bingo on Sundays And Trivia on Mondays.

In a Sept 2012 newsletter article then President of IBSSA Vald Svekis wrote that the Sapphire Park kayak launch was difficult to use and drop off perilous. The association had asked the city for help and the goal was to have new launch by early 2013. Fast forward to April 2022 Kate Bloomquist then Beautification Chair, Bill Townsend, and myself met with Jerry Fogle Director of City Park and Recreation, and GM Candie Pederson at our kayak launch to ask the city for help to create a user friendly less dangerous kayak launch for our neighborhood to enjoy. No promises were made but

they did agree to see what could be done. The new launch would need the city engineers to take a look at what was there and design a new approach to the opening. If you have not gone to Sapphire Shores Park lately go see our new user-friendly launch. They are still working on part of the sidewalk and wall to the north, but this launch allows us all to have water access without a dangerous step down. It only took 10 years and a new City Park Director. Thank you Jerry Fogle and your team for this beautiful addition to our park.

BEACH CONDITIONS REPORTING SYSTEM

The Beach Conditions Reporting System (BCRS) provides conditions reports for over 50 locations to help the public make informed decisions when planning a day at the beach or other coastal recreation areas.



Go to **visitbeaches.org** or **download the free app** by searching "BCRS - Mote Marine Laboratory" in the App Store (iOS) or Google Play (Android).

Reports are updated regularly by trained Beach Ambassadors:

- Environmental conditions such as sea surface temperature, wind speed, surf, crowds and more.
- Updates related to Florida red tide—observations of dead fish and of beachgoers experiencing respiratory irritation.
- Beach amenities such as picnic tables, playgrounds, barbecue grills and restrooms.

The BCRS also offers an Education Portal with FAQs, infographics and videos on key topics for beachgoers, along with links to additional resources.

The Fruits of our Labor

When we moved here there was a Honey Bell orange tree in our front yard. It wasn't very old and the first year only produced a few oranges. But each year there were more. They were the most fantastic navel oranges you could imagine and quite a temptation to strollers. My neighbor ridiculed me for coming out in the morning and counting them to see if any were poached during the night. That's how much I loved these oranges. We lost it to "the greening" but I have always been fascinated with fruit trees.


One of my daughters developed a similar passion. Before she was even 10 years old and while accompanying me on Real Estate chores, she developed the map you see below. Many of the trees she identified were in Zombie House yards. Remember Zombie Houses?

In the depths of the housing recession around 2010 some owners simply walked away from their homes rather than work a short sale or wait for the eviction notice. This left many fruit trees unattended. Maybe we convinced ourselves that we were keeping rodent populations down or maybe we were poaching but, in any event, it was quite a learning experience.

Together we learned something is available almost every month of the year. And this used to be quite the Real Estate driver. The Amish came for their winter "truck farms". Bertha Potter Palmer sold small ranchettes to snowbirds. And in our neighborhood some yards show evidence of small groves of more than a dozen trees.

Over the years I have known three neighbors who claimed to live almost entirely off produce grown in their yard. I have seen these places and sold one. It was a year after the homeowner passed and we saw firsthand what happens when 20 or more fruit trees and an assortment of berry bushes are not harvested in a timely manner...and a cozy warm attic is nearby. I won't go into detail, but it contributed to the feeling my daughter and I had harvesting fruit at Zombie Houses. Maybe we convinced ourselves we were doing a service to the neighborhood, but the work was certainly rewarding.

The Indian Beach Sapphire Shores neighborhood continues to prosper and be a desirable area to put down roots. It boasts new construction while also maintaining the "old Florida" charm, making it a special place to call home.

Here are some of the latest facts and figures:

- The February 2023 median listing price in Sarasota was \$579,000. In Indian Beach Sapphire Shores it is \$962,500, which is up 17% over last year.
- The average price per square foot in Sarasota is \$332. Comparatively, it is \$471 per square foot in Indian Beach Sapphire Shores.
